


GOVE BORACAY 2025 BIGGER AND STRONGER THAN EVER

he Malay-Boracay Tourism Office promises a more colorful celebration for this year's "Love Boracay" festival.

"Love Boracay," the annual beach party event is a reinvention of the original "LaBoracay," a series of beach parties that culminated on Labor Day (May 1).

In 2019, after the island reopened to tourism following a six-month rehabilitation

when it became an independent province from Capiz. The province was inaugurated on November 8, 1956.

Last year, the provincial government celebrated its foundation day by holding a Provincial Agri-Aqua Trade Fair at the Wetland Park No. 4 (Laketown) alongside the Love Boracay Food Bazaar with food kiosks celebrating Malay municipality's culinary specialties and Aklan-made souvenir items lining the main road which was closed to traffic, and throughout the promenade. This event was supported by the Provincial Agriculture Office and the Provincial Agriculture and Fisheries Council.

Past Love Boracay events

Past Love Boracay celebrations evolved from a mainland Malay feast to a multi-day

event featuring a wide range of activities. These have included parades, sports competitions (volleyball, soccer, Frisbee), a paraw regatta (native boat race), beach parties, music and arts festivals, and the Obreros Festival dance showdown. The event typically runs for several days in April and May.

Boracay's tourism boom

Boracay's tourism sector is experiencing a significant surge. In the first two months of 2025 alone, tourist arrivals exceeded those of the same period in 2024 by over 600. This growth is fueled by both domestic and international tourists, with South Korea remaining a key international market. The appointment of a new South Korean celebrity tourism ambassador is expected to further boost tourist arrivals. T

The Journey from LaBoracay to Love Boracay

he journey from the infamous Labor Day weekend parties called "LaBoracay" to today's much-loved "Love Boracay" festival began in 2019 when the Boracay Inter-Agency Rehabilitation Management Group (BIARMG)-the ruling government body at the time, announced its support for a weeklong initiative to celebrate the rehabilitation efforts of Boracay Island.

Boracay Island underwent a six-month closure for environmental rehabilitation back on April 26, 2018, by virtue of Proclamation No. 475 by President Rodrigo R. Duterte.

The BIARMG task force, composed of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), the Department of Tourism (DOT) and the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG) canceled the annual weeklong Labor Day beach party formerly dubbed as "LaBoracay" (pronounced as \'ley-bo-'ra-kay\)-a term coined from combining "Labor Day" and "Boracay" that was notorious for no-holds-barred island-wide events marked by big stage performances by local and international DJs and artists along world-famous White Beach, that drew tens of thousands of revelers and with it, their garbage in the aftermath resulting in a bad rap and eventually, a permanent ban.

The following year (2019), in strict adherence to environmental preservation,

the task force ordered the banning of parties and drinking and smoking in Boracay, which was implemented when the island was reopened to tourists in October 2018. Then-Tourism Sec. Bernadette Romulo-Puyat said, "Bawal po ang LaBoracay. (LaBoracay is prohibited.) No drinking, no smoking in public places."

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, festivities were cancelled in 2020 and 2021, but Love Boracay made a return in 2022 with eco-conscious activities like clean-up drives and music festivals.

Consequently, the local government unit of Malay (LGU-Malay) proposed a novel approach to the Labor Day celebrations: a focus on advocating tourism sustainability, wellness and the arts. The task force announced its support for the initiative to celebrate rehabilitation efforts in the world-famous tourist spot, likewise commemorating the first anniversary of the island's closure.

In 2023, the event made its comeback with a weeklong "Love Boracay 2023" celebration dubbed "Love Boracay: Celebrate, Rehabilitate," with environmentfriendly activities celebrating the rehabilitation of the island. The biggest summer event of the season saw a revival of the festive (and a much more subdued) island party vibe.

Tourism Secretary Christina Garcia

Frasco made her first-ever public appearance on Boracay Island, the "Crown Jewel of Philippine Tourism," since assuming her post as DOT chief, gracing the "Love Boracay" 2023 festival's opening ceremony at the beachfront of Epic Boracay along White Beach. Leading the festivities were Aklan Governor Jose Miraflores, Mayor Floribar Bautista, DOT Region 6 Director Crisanta Rodriguez and other officials.

In her speech, the tourism chief said, "Boracay has always seen us through despite all of the difficulties and challenges faced by the tourism industry and it continues to be the beacon of hope for tourism destinations all over the Philippines. Salamat Boracay, congratulations."



Get with the program! **Digital Apps for Boracay Travelers**

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ourists to Boracay Island can now enjoy a seamless travel experience, thanks to some recently introduced technology applications.

On February 18, 2025, executives of the Cebu-based Topline Hi-Tech and Synergy Corporation signed a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) at the Aklan Provincial Capitol with Governor Jose Enrique Miraflores and Atty. Selwyn Ibaretta, the provincial administrator.

Also present in the MOA signing were Topline President Eugene Erick Lim, Vice President and CEO Atty. Constance Marie Lim, and Senior Vice President and COO

Bridgette Carmel Lim.

According to Miraflores, Topline will install its digital facilities at the Caticlan Jetty Port this month (April).

"Department of Tourism (DOT) Secretary Christina Frasco introduced us to the Topline executives," Miraflores said.

According to Lim, "The purpose of the app is to improve the Boracay experience, streamlining travel planning and enhancing on-island adventures, with a travel guide, specialized tools for navigation, translation and itinerary management."

On the other hand, PisoPay's Boracay iPass web app ticketing system was

introduced in December 2024. Finally, the payment of terminal and environmental fees and boat fare to and from Boracay Island was made possible in a single touristfriendly app.

Both apps promise to improve their user-friendly interfaces to include reserving tours and activities, accepting various international payment methods, and even assigning a personal tour guide for a seamless experience.

According to Caticlan Jetty Port administrator Esel Flores, the provincial government has set conditions for the different app companies to develop one super app where all related services will be merged into one.

The apps are currently optional for both tourists and residents. Topline and the Boracay iPass both charge PhP75 for services.

Here are other helpful applications that can enhance the travel experience:

The Philippine Flight App assists by comparing flight options based on price, schedule and airline which are crucial for planning one's arrival and departure.

For foreign tourists, language translation apps come in handy. Google Translate and iTranslate (to the English language) break down language barriers by providing instant translations for text, speech and even images. These apps are invaluable for communicating with locals, understanding signs and ordering food.

For currency conversion, apps like XE Currency and Trail Wallet help tourists manage their finances by providing realtime exchange rates and tracking expenses. This allows travelers to stay within their budget and avoid unnecessary fees.

The use of Viber, WhatsApp, Facebook, Instagram and Telegram also enables tourists to stay connected with friends and family back home through messaging, voice and video chats. These apps are essential for sharing travel experiences and staying updated on important information.

Finally, Google Maps can assist in finding specific locations of hotels, restaurants or sea sports services in Boracay.

Travelers are increasingly embracing technology apps to make their travel experience more convenient, efficient and pleasurable. These apps offer a wide range of features that address various needs, from planning and booking to navigating unfamiliar areas, communicating with locals and even enhancing the sightseeing experience.

NEWS **DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE TO DECIDE ON MALAY LGU FEES**

he Local Government Unit (LGU) of Malay will let the Department of Finance (DOF) central office decide whether to scrap or continue the controversial fees charged to tourists visiting Boracay Island.

In a phone interview last March 4, 2025, Malay Mayor Frolibar Bautista told the Boracay Sun News (BSN) that the LGU-Malay had just completed a workshop initiated by the DOF-Bureau of Local Finance (BLGF). The workshop was held on March 3-4 at the Sangguniang Bayan (SB) office in Poblacion, Malay.

The workshop was attended by the Municipal Environment and Natural Resources office, the Treasurer's office, the Municipal Accounting office, and the SB departments of the local government.

According to Bautista, the required documents would be submitted to the Bureau by March 7.

"The DOF will then determine if the fees the LGU collects are justifiable or not. We will abide by whatever they recommend," Bautista said.

The accounting of the controversial fees developed after Department of Tourism (DOT) Secretary Christina Garcia Frasco, in a Manila Prince Hotel media forum on January 22, was asked by a journalist about alleged complaints from hotel and restaurant owners and operators that Boracay was not being promoted enough by the DOT, which was causing low occupancy rates.

Frasco denied these claims and bared that members of the Philippine Hotel Owners Association (PHOA) and the Tourism Congress of the Philippines confided in her about the challenges they have been facing.

"Both organizations are unanimous in their report to us that the challenges they face in Boracay emanate from excessive fees that are being implemented as far as tourist activities are concerned," she said during the media forum.

Frasco then explained that the DOT is not responsible for these fees, which are instead enforced by the LGU. Instead, the DOT has asked the Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG) to intervene and hold a dialogue with the LGU on these concerns.

On February 17, 2025, the DILG, together with the DOT and LGU Malay and the province of Aklan officials met at the Philippine International Convention Center (PICC) in Pasay City to discuss the fees being charged by the Malay LGU.

Aklan Governor Jose Enrique Miraflores told the BSN on February 18, 2025, that he attended the said meeting. "The DILG has officially asked the Malay LGU to study the fees being collected and possibly reduce it. The province leads in the collection of the terminal fees in Boracay and has shares in the environmental fees. It is hoped that the reduction of fees will lure more foreign and local tourists that come to Boracay," he said.

Also in a statement to the **BSN**, the Boracay MICE Alliance (Meetings, Incentives, Conferences and Exhibits) said that they welcome the dialogue among the LGU, the DOT and the DILG.

"We would like to wait for further developments to fall into place for us to gauge what options will be best for our guests. As an organization, we continuously welcome a dialogue with the LGU to strengthen their efforts in coming up with a decision and directive that benefits all stakeholders including the service providers and guests all in all," the statement reads.

Other private Boracay Island stakeholder groups in attendance at the PICC forum were representatives of the Boracay Foundation, Inc. and the Philippine Chamber of Commerce-Boracay.

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AKELCO Board President Virgilio Sacdalan re-elected for a second term

ALIBO, Aklan – The management of the Aklan Electric Cooperative (AKELCO) recently announced a power rate hike expected to be felt by April 2025.

This, after the Energy Regulatory Commission (ERC) in Metro Manila had approved the application of the National Transmission Corporation (TransCo) for the so-called Feed-in Tariff Allowance (FIT-ALL) for 2024 under ERC Case number 2023-096 on February 19, 2025.

With this approval, the FIT-ALL Rate will increase from P0.0838 per kWh to P0.1189 per kWh, which takes effect starting with the March 2025 billing. The March bill will be paid in April.

The feed-in tariff (FIT) in the Philippines is a policy that guarantees a price for renewable energy producers, which helps develop renewable energy sources. It was established in 2010 to promote investments in renewable energy (RE) by providing eligible developers with a fixed, above-market rate for the electricity they generate. This initiative aims to encourage the growth of green energy sources such as solar, wind, hydro, and biomass which reduce carbon emissions and ensure environmental sustainability.

AKELCO said in a statement: "As an electric cooperative, AKELCO has no control over the determination or

adjustments of the FIT-All rate. The cooperative's responsibility is solely to collect the charges from its member-consumers and promptly remit them to TransCo, which administers the fund. Since this is a pass-through charge, AKELCO neither retains portions of the collected amount nor derives any financial benefit from it."

AKELCO Terminates Pole Contracts to Eliminate Spaghetti Wires

Power cooperative AKELCO announced that it had terminated all expiring contracts of telecommunication companies that are attached to their electric poles this year.

Atty. Ariel Gepty, acting general manager of AKELCO in an episode of *Kapihan sa Aklan*, said that the termination of contracts was needed to get rid of all the unnecessary wires that are attached to the electric poles.

Kapihan sa Aklan is a talk show produced by the Kalibo Cable TV Network Inc. in cooperation with the Aklan Press Club.

"Only 10 telecoms are allowed to place their lines on our poles anywhere in our jurisdiction. But there are too many poles, especially in Kalibo and Boracay," Atty Gepty said.

These telecom distribution lines affect the electric poles causing spaghetti wires. The spaghetti wires cause hazards to AKELCO linemen when repairing their distribution lines and also cause public disturbances.

Among the telecom companies that now have to come

up with their own poles or wait for AKELCO to renew the contracts were Kalibo Cable TV, Converge, PANTELCO, Paradise Cable TV, Globe and Smart among others.

"Based on our estimates, the number of telecom companies in Aklan do not reach 10. So, who are the rest?

We will never know. We will wait until the end of this year before we remove all the New attached lines," Gepty said.

> As such, telecom companies could not expand their operations and services because of their already limited capacity to connect.

According to Gepty, AKLECO will probably renew the contracts once their poles have been cleared of excess distribution lines.

The electric cooperative also announced the re-election of Virgilio Sacdalan as board director president for

Boracay Island, serving his second term unopposed. Elections were held last March 1, at the Balabag Elementary School.

"The AKELCO thanked District 10 Election Committee (DECOM) members Ma. Ninfa Desiree Segovia, Lilanir Jebulan and Michelle Jumuad, and AKELCO personnel who assisted in the district elections," the power cooperative said. [™]

Malay CCTV Council Formed

o ensure the safety, surveillance and security of residents, businesses and travelers not only in Boracay but also in the entire Malay municipality, the Local Government Unit (LGU) has formed a Malay CCTV Council.

According to the Malay Municipal Disaster Risks Reduction and Management Office (MDRRMO-Malay), the concept of creating the council started in 2023. This is also the first council of its kind in the Western Visayas region.

The council is chaired by Malay Mayor Frolibar Bautista together with the Malay MDRRMO, the Malay Municipal Police Station (Malay-MPS), and the Sanguniang Bayan, among others.

Malay Councilor Maria Victoria "Vicky" Aguirre

introduced the said ordinance.

Councilor Aguirre said that the council will soon mandate for business establishments in Boracay to install their own CCTVs. These will then be followed in Malay, Aklan.

Also to be given priority are crime- or incident-prone areas which are to be identified by the Malay MPS.

The council conducted its first meeting last March 7, 2025, which included a demonstration of the minimum recommended specifications for CCTV cameras in business establishments, government offices, and public areas outlined in the DILG Memorandum Circular No. 2022-060. This ensures high-quality footage that can be used for crime prevention, disaster response, and emergency management.



The council encourages businesses in the Malay municipality to comply with the ordinance and install their own operational CCTV based on the prescribed standards for their own safety.



Teenage Pregnancy Rising BY JUN N. AGUIRRE

The Local Government Unit of Malay has expressed alarm over the rise in teenage pregnancies in the municipality, especially in Boracay.

On March 6, 2025, the Sangguniang Bayan indicated in its agenda for discussion the proposed ordinance (legislation) providing for prevention programs to address the increasing incidence of adolescent pregnancies within the territorial jurisdiction of Malay and providing funds thereof.

Based on the records of the Provincial Population and Gender Office, the Malay Rural Health Unit (RHU) recorded 122 adolescent pregnancy cases in 2023. The youngest was 15 years old.

However, in 2024, the RHU recorded another 133 cases with two cases as young as below 14 years old, registered in Boracay Island. According to the World Health Organization on its website, adolescent pregnancy is a global phenomenon with clearly known causes and serious health, social and economic consequences.

Globally, the adolescent birth rate (ABR) has decreased, but rates of change have been uneven across regions. There are also enormous variations in levels between and within countries. Adolescent pregnancy tends to be higher among those with less education or of low economic status.

In the Philippines, the Commission on Population and Development (CPD) has sounded the alarm over the rising incidence of adolescent pregnancies, particularly those under 15 years old.

In a news release by the *Philippines News Agency*, CPD Undersecretary Lisa Grace Bersales said that the alarming trend demands immediate action, highlighting the need for comprehensive, age-sensitive sexuality education to address the issue.

"Our emphasis is on protection from abuse and equipping adolescents with life skills to make informed decisions," she said.

Citing Philippine Statistics Authority data, Bersales noted that live births among girls aged 10 to 14 rose from 2,411 in 2019 to 3,343 in 2023, a 6.6 percent increase. More troubling, she added, 38 girls under 15 experienced multiple pregnancies in 2023, and 17 women under 20 had given birth five or more times.

According to the National Library of Medicine, pregnancy in adolescence is a health problem worldwide. Teenagers themselves are a high-risk group in need of highpriority interventions.

In general, most pregnancies in adolescence are extramarital and unintended. Psychological immaturity is common among adolescent mothers. Because they do not understand the value of family planning, they often engage in risky sexual behavior and become pregnant while still in school and still living with their parents.

This study confirms that teenage mothers are significantly more likely to have a low level of education.

Adolescent girls often drop out of school due to pregnancy or childbirth. Sometimes problems at school and poor school performance appear even before pregnancy. Some teenage girls who are not doing well in school may find motherhood an attractive option.

Early pregnancies are significantly reduced by education; the more years of education, the lower the rate of early pregnancies. \uparrow





or many, Boracay is considered a paradise with its pristine white sand beaches, picture-perfect sunsets, safety and security, fresh air and friendly people.

Boracay is also considered one of the best places to retire. Despite this, according to the Philippine Retirement Authority (PRA), there are not many foreign retirees residing in Boracay.

According to Melvin







Magbuhat, program

development and marketing division chief, they have included Boracay and the province of Aklan in their promotional campaigns as a haven for retirees.

He admitted, however, that despite being globally renowned as a paradise destination, Boracay needs to boost its capabilities as a retirement destination such as international standard healthcare, a stable internet, water and electrical supply.

"Boracay also has a reputation of being an expensive destination, not just for daily living but also for business," Magbuhat said.

Nevertheless, the PRA is keen on promoting Boracay as a potential retirement haven for foreigners, expats or balikbayans.

The PRA has pegged the cost of living and other financial considerations for a comfortable retirement in the Philippines between US\$800 to 1,200 per month.


According to Magubat, the Philippines, particularly Boracay appeals to retirees because of its natural beauty friendly, hospitable Filipino traits, and government support.

One may apply for a government-issued Special Resident Retiree's Visa (SRRV). To qualify, one must be 50 years old and above and have a pension of at least US\$800 per month (or US\$1,000 for couples). You'll also need to deposit US\$10,000 to a Philippine bank.

While land ownership for expats and foreigners is strictly prohibited, retirees are allowed to purchase condominiums and townhouses.

The requirements include a valid passport to the Philippines, a PRA application form, a medical certificate, a bank certificate of deposit and proof of pension.

Why are we so scared or shy to talk to each other, to book that room, to call the front desk and confirm packages or amenities, as advertised? Have a business? Improve service and train staff to gain the best organic reviews on a personal level with your customers that no online platform can take from you. Scammed into a bad activity package? Talk to peers over lunch or drinks and let them guide you as to where the best and most reliable services are.







ast month, we began the first of this two-part series on media use guidelines for families. If you missed it, you can find it online at www. boracaysunnews.com/newspaper.

When asked about my opinion regarding screen time, I often say that it's about finding a balance.

Screen time refers to the amount of time spent using devices with screens, such as smartphones, tablets, computers and televisions which all can affect how children feel, learn, think and behave. It's important to be mindful of screen time, as excessive use can lead to various health issues, including eye strain, poor posture and disrupted sleep patterns.

The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) recommends minimizing or eliminating media exposure, other than video chatting, for children under the age of 18 months. For older preschool-age children, media limits are very appropriate.

There are risks and benefits that come with media use. The key is to develop habits that help your family strike a healthy balance. You can decide what media use is best for your family. Remember, all children and teens need adequate sleep (8–12 hours, depending on age), physical activity (1 hour), and time away from media. We suggest having a strategy for managing electronic media to maximize its benefits and minimize its risks.

Co-view or co-play with your children, and find other activities to do together that are healthy for the body and mind. Great examples include reading, talking and playing together.

When you cannot sit down and actively engage in play with your child, supervising independent play for infants and young children is more beneficial than use of screen media. For example, have your child play with nesting cups on the floor nearby while you prepare dinner.

Designate media-free times together (such as during family dinners) and mediafree zones (such as bedrooms). Recognize that your own media use can have a negative effect on children. We encourage families to develop personalized media use plans. Media plans should take into account each child's age, health, personality and developmental stage. Remember to communicate your plan to other caregivers, such as babysitters or grandparents, so that media rules are followed consistently.

At the same time, do not feel pressured to introduce technology early. Media devices are designed to be intuitive, and children can learn quickly. Parents today are more pressed for time than any other generation, and smartphones are being used left and right to connect and manage, but using them too much can get in the way of parentchild interactions which in turn can cause a delay in communication skills.

Find out what type of and how much media are used and what media behaviors are appropriate for each child, and for you.

Here are more tips for managing screen time:

- Place consistent limits on hours of media use as well as types of media used.
- Check your children's media use for their health and safety.
- Stop use of devices or screens one hour before bedtime. Do not let your children sleep with devices such as smartphones.
- Discourage entertainment media while doing homework.
- Plan media-free times together, such as family dinners.
- Decide on media-free, unplugged locations in homes, such as bedrooms.
- Engage in family activities that promote wellbeing, such as sports, reading and talking with each other.
- Set a good example. Switch off the TV

and put your smartphone on "do not disturb" during media-free times with your family.

- Set Limits: Establish specific time limits for using devices, especially for recreational activities.
- Take Breaks: Follow the 20-20-20 rule: every 20 minutes, take a 20-second break and look at something 20 feet away.

It's important to remember that while screens can be educational and entertaining, too much screen time can lead to issues such as obesity, sleep problems and delays in language and social skills development.

For children under two years old, screen time should be limited to video chatting with an adult. For children aged two to five, limit screen time to one hour a day of highquality programming.

Remember, your young child looks up to you. Communication skills are critical to a child's development, and it is learned through listening, talking, reading, singing and playing. These interactions can be lost while using a smartphone. Your child may *not* thank you, but you'll be thankful you took the time to be mindful in balancing its use.

midst life's uncertainties, an ancient healing ritual emerges as a holistic practice.


Last February, Tirta Spa introduced a ceremony that opens the heart through cacao and transformational vibrations of sound healing, letting love regenerate and radiate.

hen Stefan Becker moved to Boracay in September 2018, he quickly noticed a major issue: Logistics on the island weren't keeping up with its fast-growing business scene. As CEO of SRB Cargo, he saw both a challenge and an opportunity: to expand the company, which had been around since 2004, and bring better logistics to the island. Many businesses were struggling with slow, unreliable services that made daily operations harder than they should be. Seeing this firsthand, he set out to change it. In this interview, he shares his journey, insights on island logistics, and his vision for Boracay's business future.

Why did you pursue a career in logistics? How did your business begin?

I've always enjoyed the idea of moving things efficiently from Point A to Point B and seeing how logistics plays a crucial role in people's lives. Ninety-nine percent of the time, people are happy to receive their cargo, and being part of that process is fulfilling.

Logistics is also incredibly diverse—from handling different cargo sizes, weights and special requirements to optimizing routes and efficiency. The complexity excites me, especially in a challenging environment like the Philippines, where logistics is crucial for both businesses and individuals. SRB Cargo had already been operating on the mainland for years, but when I looked into Boracay's logistics, I saw a major gap. The island had five-star businesses, but logistics services

often felt two-star. That challenge motivated me to bring higher standards to the industry.

What major challenges have you encountered so far?

The biggest challenge has been change management. It's shifting the mindset from just "getting things done" to growth, innovation, and structured efficiency. I joined SRB Cargo six years ago; stepping into a wellestablished company and reshaping processes while maintaining stability was tough.

The pandemic was another turning point. Like many businesses, we took a hit, but we used that time to go digital, improve internal processes, and optimize our operations. That period allowed us to rethink logistics on an island like Boracay, making it more efficient, modern, and reliable. How did we overcome these challenges? An open mindset, tackling the biggest problem, and continuous learning. I spent a lot of time reading, watching industry videos, and talking to experts and customers. It's all about trial and error until you find the right solution.

What made you decide to live on Boracay? What do you love most about it?

My family roots are in Aklan (Batan), and my parents have lived here for years. We visited Boracay before it had electricity, coming one to three times a year. I moved here for both business and lifestyle reasons. After spending years in Manila, I knew that city life wasn't for me. I also lived on a smaller island for two years, so I understood the balance of island life and business challenges. Boracay is perfect—it has an island feel but with a solid infrastructure.

What do I love most? The people. I've met incredible individuals here. People who inspire me and whom I deeply respect. Boracay's community is special, and I've built friendships here that will last a lifetime.

Why did you choose to expand SRB Cargo to Boracay?

We've been serving Kalibo for 21 years and Roxas City since 2009, and Boracay was naturally "on the way." This gave us a unique advantage to offer faster and more frequent deliveries. The biggest logistics issues I noticed on Boracay were speed, reliability, and professionalism. Many businesses struggled with delays and inconsistent service, which hurt their operations. We wanted to change that. Another aspect we focus on is presentation. When logistics look professional, businesses look professional too. Our goal is to be a trusted, efficient partner for businesses on Boracay.

What are your biggest business achievements so far?

One of our most exciting milestones is launching Cold Chain Logistics. Since this year, we've been running weekly chilled and frozen shipments from Manila to Boracay, which opens up huge opportunities for food and beverage businesses. SRB Cargo is now one of the biggest logistics providers on the island, working with key industry players. Businesses trust us with high-value items, time-sensitive deliveries, and temperaturecontrolled shipments—all crucial for their success.

What keeps you preoccupied outside of work?

Outside of work, I spend my time with family and friends, traveling and enjoying great food. I'm also passionate about sports and diving whenever I get the chance. And, of course, my girlfriend, Gene, is a big part of my life—she's an incredible support system and constantly challenges me to be better.

What most people don't know about you?

I played the drums in a band for six years. Music has always been a huge passion of

mine, and while I don't play as much now, I still love listening to pop, alternative, funk, and synth music. I also love problem-solving. I enjoy breaking things down and optimizing efficiency in business or daily life. I guess that's why I thrive in logistics.

What is Boracay's most bankable feature for businesses? How should businesses support sustainability?

Boracay's global reputation makes it a strong business hub—not just for tourism but for logistics, retail, and services. However, businesses must also contribute to sustainability. At SRB Cargo, we focus on better route planning and cold chain logistics to reduce food waste. Every business, big or small, can take steps to protect Boracay's future.

What is your message to the Boracay community, leaders, and youth?

To the community: Strive for better service, better infrastructure, and a stronger economy. To leaders: Balance growth and sustainability. The island's long-term success depends on responsible decision-making. To the youth: Be curious, take risks, and keep learning. Boracay's future depends on your creativity and ambition—there are opportunities beyond traditional tourism.

What are your business goals this year and in five years?

This year, we focus on expanding Cold Chain Logistics and making SRB Cargo even more efficient and reliable. We are also actively exploring a greener future and using modern technology to enhance logistics while minimizing environmental impact. Looking ahead, we want to strengthen our B2B services and help businesses "look better" by providing logistics that align with their high standards.



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Boracay Island is a Haven for Divers

plethora of marine animals, from anemone fish, titan trigger fish, sea turtles, long horn cowfish, porcupine pufferfish, white tip reef sharks, and marbled rays?

A fishing village situated in the Sibuyan and Sulu Sea, Boracay is a fantastic island to dive every day of the year as it is not restricted by seasonal wind changes. All levels of divers can enjoy the many dive sites that Boracay has to offer. From March to October, divers can enjoy the shallow reef patches like Friday's Rock or deep wrecks like Camia II. From October to March, the wind shifts and divers can have a high chance to encounter nesting sea turtles in Laguna or giant frogfish in Crocodile Island.

What is there to see?

Divers at the beginner level, Open Water Divers (OWD), can usually encounter reef fish like parrot fish and trumpet fish at shallow dive sites at 18 meters maximum. More experienced divers like Advanced Open Water Divers (AOWD) to Master Scuba Divers (MSD) at 40 meters maximum, have a higher chance to encounter migratory and pelagic marine species in the deep blue like sea turtles, white tip reef sharks, eagle rays, and if they are extremely lucky, thresher sharks, manta rays and whale sharks!

REAL Big Fish

Bigger pelagic species in Boracay find safe refuge from fishermen in deeper dive sites like Yapak, Punta Bunga, Virgin Drop, Camia II, and Tribird. The most common pelagic species are white tip reef sharks, eagle rays, and yellow finned tuna.

Last January, divers spotted an adult whale shark at Camia II! Whale sharks (Rhincodon typus) are the largest fish in the world and a migratory species that are rarely spotted in Boracay. Previously, a juvenile whale shark was spotted two years ago. Whale sharks feed off smaller fish and Camia II is a perfect stop for these filter feeders. No one knows when these giant creatures will be spotted again here, but thanks to the efforts of the Bohol LGU to preserve this species' migratory habits, hopefully, soon.

The suspension of whale shark viewing is due to the increasing interference on feeding whale sharks which creates an unnatural dependence on humans and disrupts their migratory routines. Big changes are necessary to protect these big fish!

Understanding the Need for a Hyperbaric Decompression Chamber

A hyperbaric decompression chamber is currently being installed at the Ciriacao S. Tirol Hospital, funded by the Department of Tourism.

Divers from around the world flock to Boracay to explore its waters. For this reason, it is logical to provide emergency care for diving-related injuries. All diving guests and students are instructed on the skills to be a safe diver like assembling gear properly, underwater navigation, and being aware of inherent risks and constant variabilities of the ocean. The scuba tank contains compressed air which is 21% oxygen and 79% nitrogen and other trace gases. On every scuba dive, the human body becomes saturated with nitrogen and every diver is taught to decompress at depth to release the nitrogen molecules from the body before surfacing. If a diver rapidly ascends to the surface from depth, overstays the decompression limits at depth, or boards a commercial flight after their dive on the same day, then the partial pressure of nitrogen can oversaturate body tissue and create bubbles that can block vital blood flow. This is called decompression sickness (DCS), also known as "the bends." Common symptoms after rapid ascent or violating no-decompression-limits can manifest

between one to six hours after surfacing from a dive. These symptoms include pain in the joints, numbness, tingling, extreme fatigue, skin rashes and chest pain.

The majority of divers recover quickly from DCS, but some need to be administered oxygen or hyperbaric chamber therapy. A hyperbaric chamber is used to help divers decompress by simulating the pressure at depth so the body can safely release levels of nitrogen to normal levels. At present, the closest fully functioning hyperbaric chambers to Boracay Island in operation are in Batangas and Cebu.

SPORTS Strengthening Water Safety Regulations for Kiteboarding and Windsurfing by Pauline Reitzer



n light of the accidental death of a Korean kiteboarder on January 28, 2025, concerns have been raised about the safety measures in place for water sports enthusiasts. The incident, which involved a health-related emergency, has prompted discussions on improving regulations to ensure the wellbeing of kiteboarders and windsurfers.

Boracay Sun News asked Nenette Graf, president of the Kiteboard Association, to share insights on the current safety protocols and potential improvements.

Registration for Kiteboarders

One of the key suggestions is the implementation of a kiteboarding registration policy, potentially under the Boracay Water Sports Association (BWSA) or a dedicated kiteboard association. According to Nenette, there have been efforts to encourage resorts offering kiteboarding rentals to enroll and register their guests at local kite shops. This initiative aims to educate independent kiteboarders on safety protocols and ensure they understand the rules before engaging in the sport.

Existing Safety Regulations

Safety is a top priority in kiteboarding and windsurfing. Before graduating, students are trained on essential safety regulations, including right-of-way rules, maintaining a safe distance of at least 50 meters from the shore when jumping, and giving way to beginners and students who are wearing helmets. Additionally, visitors are warned about potential hazards like sea urchins to minimize accidents.

Safety Signage and Warnings

Currently, Bulabog Beach lacks official safety reminder signage. Instead, it is expected that kiteboarding schools provide safety briefings and reminders to visiting riders. During the *Habagat* season, White Beach has designated areas for kiteboarding in the northern and southern portions of White Beach where there are no swimming tourists. kiteboarding instructors and schools are well-trained in first aid as part of their certification. The community operates on a mutual watch system, ensuring that if any kiter is in distress, others can step in to help. This collaborative effort has minimized incidents in the area, aside from rare cases involving medical emergencies unrelated to the sport.

Safety Flags and Weather Warnings

Unlike on White Beach, Bulabog Beach does not have safety flags. Instead, kiteboarding schools communicate about hazardous conditions, advising riders against going out when the wind is too strong. Additionally, the Coast Guard has the authority to suspend kiteboarding activities if conditions become unsafe.

Registration and Certification for Independent Kiteboarders

Although independent kiteboarders are not required to register with a school, resort owners are encouraged to inform their guests about signing up at local kite shops for free. While registration is not mandatory, it allows schools to monitor new riders and assess their skill levels before they fully engage in the sport.

Health Certificates and Waivers

Currently, independent kiteboarders and windsurfers are not required to present a health certificate or sign a health waiver. Given the recent incident, there may be merit in implementing such requirements to ensure that individuals participating in these physically demanding sports are in good health.

Moving Forward

While the kiteboarding community has a strong support system in place, additional steps—such as mandatory registration, clear safety signage, and health certification could further enhance protection for all water sports enthusiasts. Stakeholders, including kiteboarding schools, resort operators and regulatory bodies, must work together to create a safer environment for everyone enjoying these exhilarating sports. T

FINANCIAL & TRAINING ASSISTANCE FOR TOURISM WORKERS



The Department of Tourism (DOT) announced on January 23, 2025, that tourism workers can now avail of financial and training assistance from the DOT and the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD).

This was after Tourism Secretary Christina Garcia Frasco and DSWD Secretary Rex Gatchalian formally sealed the agreement on the Bayanihan sa Bukas na may Pag-asa sa Turismo (BBMT) program last January 23.

According to the agreement, qualified tourism frontliners may now avail of the DSWD's existing cash assistance programs, including the Emergency Cash Transfers (ECT) and Cash for Work, while simultaneously receiving the DOT interventions on alternative livelihood training programs like basic *hilot*, candle making, beads and artwork training, basic bread and pastry making, detergent making, fun farm tour product development, tourism awareness and tourist reception seminar, community-based *kulinarya* and the Filipino brand of service excellence (FBSE), if their usual sources of livelihood have been disrupted by calamities and emergencies, including the recent eruption of Mt. Kanlaon in Negros Occidental.

The partnership seeks potential program participants who can be disaster-qualified tourism workers listed under the Listahanan 3; other qualified household beneficiaries under a standardized/unified targeting system used by the DSWD; other criteria prescribed in other disaster risk reduction guidelines that will be promulgated in the future; resident workers in tourism destinations or attractions; members of a community-based tourism organization or beneficiaries jointly approved by the DSWD and DOT; or may be affected by calamities or emergencies that disrupted their livelihood as tourism service providers.

Last May 27, 2024, both department secretaries attended the pilot run of the BBMT to give financial and training assistance to the victims of widespread flooding in several areas of the Davao Region and Agusan Del Sur in the Caraga region in early February 2024. The ceremony was held in Mati City, Davao Oriental.







